Elmer and I wish to remind you how the WINHEC now uses the term Higher.

WINHEC meaning of Higher Education as accepted at WINHEC AGM 2016, Otaki.

Originally, WINHEC was designed for "Higher Education", postsecondary or tertiary education. Originally, WINHEC accepted a specific western concept accepted from the mainstream education system. As Indigenous peoples we recognize that "education" is a lifelong process and occurs across time, space, and place and within relationships. As Indigenous peoples we also recognize the cycle of education as elders pass knowledge to those younger and the younger learn from all of creation through a lifetime of learning and sharing. During WINHEC's early years, we have made space for P-12 and community programs that cross all ages. WINHEC has embraced like-minded Indigenous peoples in our journey to remember, share, and relearn our respective teachings. In doing so, we have been humbled by the depths and heights of knowledge held in our languages, songs, stories, and ceremonies. We now understand "Higher Education" as that which opens our Indigenous minds to all that has been given to us by Creator and challenges us to be who we were intended to be as Indigenous peoples. We must remember and take our place in this world and seek to stand on our highest ground, with our clearest Indigenous minds, hearts, spirit and body, reaching for Indigenous Higher Education.

With that in mind, the WINHEC Board of Accreditation Handbook will identify its 3 sectors as Postsecondary, P-12 and Indigenous Teacher Education. We are all reaching for our highest ground.



WINHEC AGM 2018 Highlights

WINHEC International Youth Camp (IYC)

- Miigwech to the organizers of the IYC, it was a huge success with Sami students hosting youth from Aotearoa, Canada, USA and Elders from Australia. Together with teachers from Sami University of Applied Science (SUAS) and Sami High School & Reindeer Husbandry School (SHS&RHS), Aotearoa and Hawaii much was accomplished. They fished, crafted, laughed, cried, sang and taught each other yoiks and haka. They presented to us, and even made a presence on youtube!
- Our two IYC Ambassadors are Elle and Larve who continue to carry their WINHEC message forward
- The organizers of the IYC are creating some teacher materials to help others conduct a IYC. It is recognized by all that the Elders were a great part of the IYC. Elders presence, participation and interaction with the youth and organizers helped everyone the importance of multi-generational knowledge transfer. Indigenous education is on the land, with multiple ages and across disciplines. We are supportive of those who are able to capture thoughts for us to read.

Board of Accreditation

- Miigwech to the BoA Co-Chairs for their untiring work to assist Institutes/Organizations/Schools/Programs work through our accreditation process
- The draft WINHEC BoA Handbook was reviewed by the BoA Board. It combines all 3 handbooks into a succinct document which articulates the thinking behind the process and guides the user through the various stages.
- Congratulations to all who have begun their accreditation journey and to those who have attained new or renewed accreditation. Hearing story of Site Visits truly helps us all understand the transformational process of our cultural accreditation process.

WINHEC MOU with Indigenous Advanced Education and Skills Council

• WINHEC signed an MOU with IAESC to partner for purposes of accreditation. The Executive is working through a process as we lead the world with our way of looking and accrediting our cultural scholarship. The MOU will be followed with a Limited Use Agreement and we are reaching for the highest quality partnership steeped in Truth, Respect and Integrity.

WINHEC Izhichigewin Practice Handbook (WIPH) and Organization Frameworkunder development

• The draft WIPH was presented to the WINHEC Executive Board. Sylvia Hussey, Exec. Brd member and Hawaiian Country/Nation Representative read and listened with great interest. She also recognized areas of concern that were not addressed in the handbook. She quickly drafted a visual representation of WINHEC with options of how to address our operational and fiscal shortcomings. We asked that she focus on the third option, a hybrid of old and new practices. During the WINHEC Exec + Committee meeting held Nov. 5-9, Sylvia presented draft 1 of the combined WIPH and Operational policies. Many decisions were made to recognizing WINHEC's history as we grew from its embriotic state, birthed to a founding body now maturing as recognizable and respected international organization complete with accreditation, research, publication, youth engagement leading to our university, WINU.

World Indigenous Nations University

Learn about our new WINHEC Executive Co-Chair

Dr. Elmer J. Guy has had a long and distinguished career in indigenous education. The President of Navajo Technical University (NTU), the largest tribal college/university among the 37 U.S. institutions of higher learning, Dr. Guy previously was the Executive Director and Deputy Director of the Navajo Nation's Department of Education, a position appointed by the Navajo Nation President.

Dr. Guy earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in Special Education at the University of Arizona and then went on to earn a Masters degree in Rehabilitation Administration at the University of San Francisco in California and his doctorate in Rehabilitation and Special Education Leadership at the University of Arizona.

As the President at NTU Dr. Guy has led an institution that has become one of the most prestigious universities in the U.S., specializing in Navajo culture and language, science, technology, engineering, math, and health education. When he first came to the presidency NTU had 316 mostly Navajo students, but has grown so that it now has four accredited instructional sites and over 1,700 students.

In addition to his presidency Dr. Guy serves on the Board of the American Indian Higher Education Consortium, the College Board's Community Colleges Advisory Panel, and a number of other regional and national associations. He is also deeply involved in the World Indigenous Nations Higher Education Consortium (WINHEC), which held a major conference at NTU's Crownpoint campus in 2013 where the World Indigenous Nations University awarded its first Honorary Doctoral degrees.

On a personal level, my wife is working on her PhD in Educational Leadership. She has an extensive background in special education and early childhood. Retired from the Arizona school system, she currently directs the early childhood program for Pascua Yaqui Nation located in Arizona. We have four children, two daughters and two sons.

I come from a strong Navajo family. My mom didn't go to any European school, but has a very strong Navajo language and culture background. She was an Herbalist, excellent traditional cook, and parent. My dad served in the United States Marine Corp as a Code talker in World War II and then worked for the federal government for 36 years.
